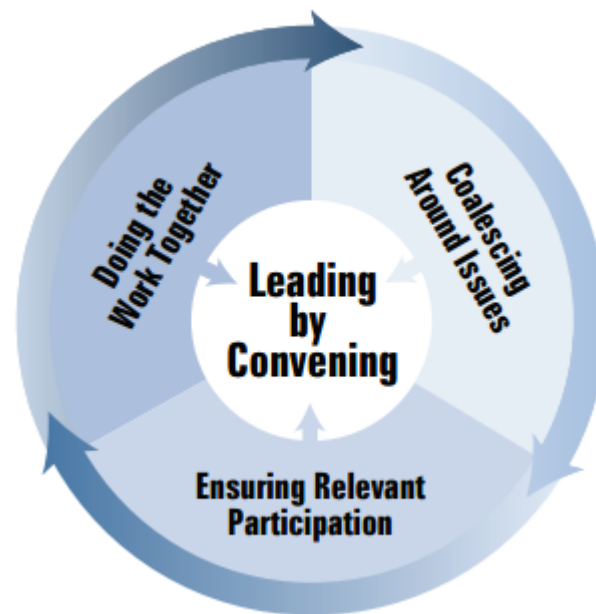

Re-Establishing Your CCoT

Today, we are going to introduce you to CCoT's that have created successful partnerships and found innovative ways to support transition.

Accessing Disability Services at College: What You Need to Know and How to Get Involved

Requesting and utilizing accommodations, modifications and assistive technology (AT) at a youth's postsecondary college or university program is one avenue to ensuring success after high school. Yet the requests provided at the secondary level sometimes do not match the accommodations allowed for postsecondary education programs. This session will explain what accommodations are allowed, and how to access these services by developing an individual accommodation plan through working with disability specialists and other CCoT members. Post school outcomes in this area will also be shared.
